The Lutheran Hospital Training School for Nurses.

This school was organized in 1898 with an enrollment of 5 nurses. From this small beginning it has steadily increased, to-day it has an enrollment of 50 students.

The School prescribes a course of three years of study and gives the students a splendid opportunity for theoretical and practical training, in medical and surgical cases; it also makes a provision for three months training in the St. Louis Maternity and two months training in the City Isolation Hospital. In every way the School has maintained the highest possible standard, keeping pace with all the advancements in theory and practice, thus meeting the requirements of the State and National organizations, and making eligible for registration in the states. Our graduates are filling positions of responsibility throughout the country, several of them are holding positions as Chief Nurse of the U. S. Army Nurse Corps in France.

The Alumnae was organized in 1904, meetings are held the first Monday in each month at the Nurses' Home, 3500 Texas Ave. During the past year the attendance of the meetings had somewhat decreased, as many of our nurses responded to the call of the Red Cross and are now in active duty, some in service in France, and some in the Base Hospitals here.

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS.

To be accepted by the Lutheran Hospital School for Nurses an applicant must be between the ages of 19 and 35 years, and in good health, having had an eighth grade grammar school and one year high school education or its equivalent (a commercial course or experience in commercial work). This is necessary to give executive ability and is very essential to women who enter the nursing profession. Accompanying the application must be a satisfactory reference from a minister, a certificate from a physician testifying to her physical and mental soundness, a certificate of vaccination against smallpox, the test having been made within one year previous to application; a certificate from a dentist certifying that the teeth are in perfect condition. When the application meets the requirements, a letter of acceptance will be sent notifying the applicant of a possible date of entrance. With this letter is sent a sample of material for the Probationers' uniform and instruction for making. Applicants who have enlarged tonsils must have them removed before entrance in School.

ACCEPTED CANDIDATES.

Students are admitted September, December, March, and June 1st. During the preliminary term the Superintendent of the Hospital will decide as to the fitness of the candidates; and if they prove satisfactory, they will be appointed pupil nurses, and receive the uniform of the School.
